Happy 200th Birthday, Grange County

A large crowd gathered in the Ruth Uyesugi Auditorium at Paoli High School to celebrate Orange County's 200th birthday on Feb.1. Imojean Dedrick, Orange County's Bicentennial Coordinator, welcomed attendees from

throughout the county. She gave a brief history of the act by local government officials on

December 26, 1815 that formed Orange County. The county was originally part of Knox, Gibson, and Washington Counties. The act took final effect on Feb. 1, 1816, thus the date us now known as Orange County's Birthday.

The crowd watched the hour long "Spirit of Orange County" produced and videographed by Jason Pear of WTIU, Bloomington. The DVD is available at the WTIU store online.

SHOC is pleased to announce the Collaborative effort has been endorsed as an Indiana Bicentennial Com-


mission Legacy Project and may use the Official Bicentennial logo.



"Who Do You Think You Are In Orange County?"

In the year 2016, our bicentennial year, the Orange County Historical Society will be honoring our early county settlers. At some point, if you qualify, there will be a ceremony to honor you and present you with a pin and a certificate.

To qualify, your ancestor must have settled in Orange County between the years of 1809 and 1860. You must submit proof of your lineage. There is a genealogy worksheet that must be submitted along with the documented proof connecting each

generation to the next.

Some of the documents that will be accepted are birth, death and marriage records, wills, census records, land records and family records. These should be copies and not originals as they do not have to be certified.. The worksheets will be available at the county

Most of the documents that will be needed are available in Orange County. Birth and death records are available at the Orange County Health Department located in the County Complex. Their records begin with the year 1882.

Marriage information is available at the Orange County Clerk's office beginning with the year 1816. The OCHS has indexes to these records and cemetery records

In order to cover the cost of certificates and pins, there is a slight cost for submitting the applications. The first application will be \$10.




Orange County Historical Society Honors Roger Moon
