

### MOODY FAMILY BIBLE COMES HOME!



During our May meeting Bob Moody made a very special presentation to the O.C. Historic Museum, The Moody Family Bible. The Bible was printed in 1829. It was owned by Bob's great-great-grandfather James Moody, who was born in Kentucky in 1803 and died in Orange County in 1883. It was eventually given to Bob's father by a second cousin, both of whom were born and died in Arkansas. Along with the family names and dates written in the Bible, there is an insert listing later births and deaths. One entry on that list indicates that Bob's great-grandfather, John Henry Moody, was born in interestingly enough "Orange County Little Orleans".

"Little Orleans" was the original name christen for the Town of Orleans over 200 years ago. Platted in 1815, Orleans stands as the oldest town in Orange County. Founded two months after Andrew Jackson's famous victory over the British at New Orleans, the settlers named their new town to honor this event.


We are indeed grateful to our friend Bob Moody for the generous donation of this rare and important artifact to the Museum Collection.






On last Saturday the people of Orange county, who were assembled on the Fair grounds, near Paoli, witnessed a most terrible sight, one which chilled the blood of all those present.

Bob held those of us in attendance fairly spellbound while sharing the strange story and tragic death of Professor Wilbur at the Orange County Fair in 1871. Bob also presented some new interesting and informative research about events leading up to that tragedy and beyond.

Civil War history came alive for our visitors' friends who were able to experience our recent "Faces of the Civil War', an Indiana Historical Society (IHS) traveling exhibit. The exhibit brought to life the stories of many Hoosiers whose lives were touched, and in some cases taken, by the Civil War. Not all are well known or revered—many were just everyday citizens fulfilling their duties to their friends, family, state and country. Rather than focusing on statistics and large-scale battles, the exhibit illustrated how regular people coped with the tragic experiences of the day—all from an Indiana perspective.
