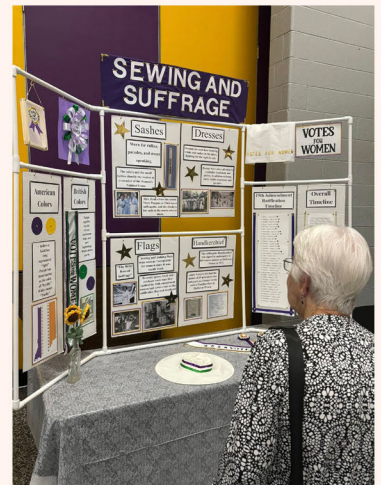

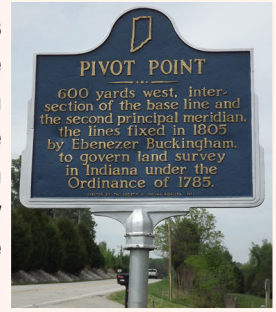

Ada’s awarding winning exhibit was “Sewing and Suffrage” How Women used Needlecraft to Get the Vote. This year’s theme was “Voices and Votes” to coincide with the upcoming America 250 Smithsonian Exhibit to be displayed at the Orange County Visitor Center in French Lick now through late June.



We want to extend a big thank you to the advanced art students at Paoli High School and their teacher Chris Jones for repainting the Pivot Point historical marker this spring! We'd also like to recognize the Orange County America 250 Committee for spearheading the effort to refurbish all three state historical markers in the county, and committee member Alan Fidler who helped replace the post for the Pivot Point marker. The marker was originally installed in 1961 and is located at SR 37 & Pivot Point Road. Pivot Point, also known as Initial Point, is the location where the initial survey of land in what became Indiana was begun in 1805 by Ebenezer Buckingham, U.S. deputy surveyor. Indiana was the first state to be completely laid out under the survey system used to set up the beginning of the legal descriptions of real estate still used in Indiana today.



TWO ORANGE COUNTY PROPERTIES ADDED TO NATIONAL REGISTER

Great News! An effort to recognize the importance of two of Orange County's historical sites has come to fruition with The Maples Farm and former French Lick Methodist Church listing on the National Register of Historic Places. Work began in 2025 when OCHS Sister organization, Saving Historic Orange County, SHOC, contracted Kurt Garner of K. W. Garner Consulting to research and submit a nomination for The Maples to be listed on the National Register. The process begins on the state level and takes about 18 months. In mid-January, the state Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology Board recommendation the listing to the National Park Service, keeper of the National Register. The French Lick Methodist Church nomination, also completed by Garner, followed a similar timeline. Garner was employed by former building owner, Sarah Stivers. It too, advanced in the DHPA Board's January session and was listed on the National Register same date as The Maples. The Maples Farm

has the honor of being the first agriculture listing in Orange County. The farm includes a circa 1841 Federal style house and farm buildings that give it significance under agriculture and architecture. The house also functioned as a stagecoach inn operated by James P. Campbell during the middle part of the 19th century. The inn was located on one of Indiana's earliest routes between Vincennes and New Albany, referred to as the Buffalo Trace or Vincennes-New Albany Road. That fact provided transportation significance to the farm. Owner of The Maples, Kelly Cuff, is a past recipient of SHOC's annual preservation award. The French Lick Methodist Episcopal Church, built in 1914, was designed by the Evansville architectural firm of Clifford Shopbell & Company. The building, late Gothic Revival style, was constructed of salt-glazed brick and features an interior dome. It was financed by one of the congregation's wealthy members known locally as "Banker Bill Cave." He decided the congregation needed a more appropriate building with stained glass windows, pipe organ, and dome to match that of West Baden Springs Hotel. He financed the building, along with other congregants, to be constructed on "Millionaire's Row" where impressive homes of the community's merchants were located. The building was listed for its architectural significance. The National Register is a function of the National Historic Preservation Act, established in 1966 to recognize sites and structures important to our heritage. The program provides rehabilitation tax credits and grants for qualifying work to homeowners, for-profit and non-profit entities, including churches and municipalities. Orange County has over 260 sites or structures listed. SHOC has funded the nomination of the Orleans Historic District, Jenkins Brothers homes, Schindler-Stetson House and The Maples Farm.

TIMELESS FRENCH LICK TO HOST SMITHSONIAN EXHIBIT AS PART OF AMERICA250 CELEBRATION

FRENCH LICK — The Orange County Convention & Visitors Bureau will play host for "Voices & Votes: Democracy in America," a Smithsonian Institution traveling exhibition, on display at the Timeless French Lick Visitors Center from Mid-May through June 28, 2026. The exhibit arrives as communities across the country prepare to mark America's 250th anniversary, and Orange County is honored to be among the select Indiana communities chosen to host this nationally recognized experience. The exhibition explores the history of American democracy — its ideals, its struggles, its triumphs, and its ongoing story — through compelling artifacts, photographs, and interactive elements. Presented as part of the Smithsonian's Museum on Main Street program, with support from Indiana Humanities, "Voices & Votes" is designed to travel to the heart of communities like ours, connecting national themes to local stories and inviting reflection on what democracy means in places where people actually live, work, and build lives together. "Voices & Votes: Democracy in America" is a traveling exhibition of the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service (SITES), adapted from the companion exhibition at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History in Washington, D.C. The Indiana tour is made possible through a partnership with Indiana Humanities.

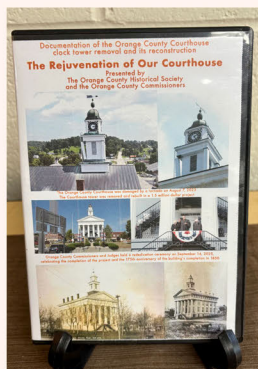
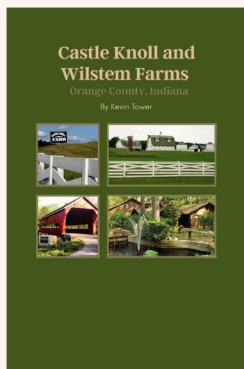
